



Euro area bank interest rate statistics: January 2018

- The composite cost-of-borrowing indicator for new loans to corporations¹ decreased by 4 basis points from the previous month to 1.67% in January 2018.
- The composite cost-of-borrowing indicator for new loans to households¹ for house purchase remained broadly unchanged at 1.84% in January 2018.
- In the same month, the euro area composite interest rate for new deposits from both corporations and households remained basically unchanged at 0.08% and 0.39%, respectively.

Bank interest rates for corporations

While the <u>composite cost-of-borrowing indicator</u>, which combines interest rates on all loans to corporations, decreased, January 2018 saw mixed developments in the cost of new borrowing by corporations both for small loans of up to €250,000 and for loans of over €1 million. For example, the interest rate on <u>new loans of over €1 million with a floating rate and an initial rate fixation period of up to three months</u> decreased by 23 basis points from the previous month to 1.11%. This month-on-month decrease was essentially due to the developments in one euro area country and it was mostly driven by the interest rate. The rate for new loans of the same size with an <u>initial rate fixation period of over ten years</u> increased by 4 basis points to 1.79%. The month-on-month increase was driven by the weight effect. In the case of <u>new loans of up to €250,000</u> with a floating rate and an initial rate fixation period of up to three months, the average rate charged remained basically unchanged at 2.39%.

¹ In this press release "corporations" refers to non-financial corporations (sector S.11 in the European System of Accounts 2010, or ESA 2010) and "households" to households and non-profit institutions serving households (ESA 2010 sectors S.14 and S.15). "Banks" refers to monetary financial institutions except central banks and money market funds (ESA 2010 sector S.122).

As regards new deposit agreements, the interest rate on <u>deposits from corporations with an agreed maturity</u> of up to one year stayed more or less constant at 0.05% in January 2018.

The interest rate on <u>new loans to sole proprietors and unincorporated partnerships with a floating rate and</u> an initial rate fixation period of up to one year remained basically unchanged at 2.29%.

Bank interest rates for households

The composite cost-of-borrowing indicator, which combines interest rates on all loans to households for house purchase, remained basically unchanged in January 2018. The interest rate on loans for house purchase with a floating rate and an initial rate fixation period of up to one year and on housing loans with an initial rate fixation period of over ten years remained basically unchanged at 1.67% and 1.90%, respectively. In the same period, the interest rate on new loans to households for consumption with a floating rate and an initial rate fixation period of up to one year rose by 60 basis points to 5.07%. This increase was essentially due to the developments in six euro area countries and it was mostly driven by the interest rate effect.

Rates agreed on new deposits from households remained basically unchanged. The interest rate on deposits with an agreed maturity of up to one year remained basically unchanged at 0.37%, while the interest rate on deposits redeemable at three months' notice remained unchanged at 0.44% in January 2018.

^{*} For this instrument category, the concept of new business is extended to the whole outstanding amounts and therefore it is not comparable with the business volumes of the other categories; deposits placed by households and corporations are allocated to the household sector. Volume data are derived from the ECB's monetary financial institutions balance sheet statistics.

Notes:

- The composite cost-of-borrowing indicators are described in the article entitled "Assessing the retail bank interest rate pass-through in the euro area at times of financial fragmentation" in the August 2013 issue of the ECB's Monthly Bulletin (see Box 1).
- Interest rates on new business are weighted by the size of the individual agreements. This is done both by the reporting agents and when the national and euro area averages are computed. Thus changes in average euro area interest rates for new business reflect, in addition to changes in interest rates, changes in the weights of individual countries' new business for the instrument categories concerned. The "interest rate effect" and the "weight effect" presented in this press release are derived from the Bennet index, which allows month-on-month developments in euro area aggregate rates resulting from changes in individual country rates (the "interest rate effect") to be disentangled from those caused by changes in the weights of individual countries' contributions (the "weight effect").
- In addition to monthly euro area bank interest rate statistics for January 2018, this press release incorporates minor revisions to data for previous periods. The hyperlinks in the press release are dynamic; thus, the data might slightly change with the next monthly release due to revisions. Unless otherwise indicated, these euro area statistics cover the EU Member States that had adopted the euro at the time to which the data relate.
- As of reference period December 2014, the sector classification applied to bank interest rates statistics is based on the European System of Accounts 2010 (ESA 2010). In accordance with the ESA 2010 classification and as opposed to ESA 95, the non-financial corporations sector (S.11) now excludes holding companies not engaged in management and similar captive financial institutions.
